The YMI celebrated the 146th Italian Heritage Columbus Day Parade on October 12th in San Francisco's North Beach by riding in the annual parade through Fisherman's Wharf and along Columbus Avenue into North Beach. 


"A True Peer Leader"

This past year, a lot of different things in my household have changed. Last year, on Halloween morning, my mother was driving to work. She had a meeting early In the morning so one of my Mom's friends drove my siblings and I to school. It was around 7:30 a.m. when my Mom got into a very serious car wreck and was CareFlighted to Miami Valley Hospital. Gracie was attending IU Bloomington at the time of the accident. When Gracie received the call about the accident, she threw a few clothes into a suitcase and rushed to the hospital My Mom was in the hospital for three and a half months and then in a nursing home/rehab facility for another two to three months. Gracie moved back to help watch over us, due to my Dad being with my Mom or in meetings for my Mom all of the time. Luckily, Gracie's professors were all very kind and understanding. She continued to take her classes online instead of having to drive to Bloomington and back every day. Gracie selflessly gave up hanging out with her friends and actually going to college to take care of her little siblings. She acted as our mother and father some days. While my Dad was away she would take us to practices, school, pick us up from practices and school, make dinner, clean the house, work on weekends, do her schoolwork, and take us to see our Mom. She, as a twenty-one year old, did what some parents combined don't do. Gracie did all of this without complaining even once. She ignored her own needs to do what's best for our family. She is always fair and always hears both sides of the story. Gracie does what she believes is right even when people don't agree. She has given up some of the best years of her life to come back and take care of her little siblings. If Gracie isn't a peer leader, I don't know who is.
